Titles: Global Accountability: U.S. Imperialism and Grass-roots Mobilization for Justice in Latin America

#### Abstract:

This panel will discuss the historical imperialist actions of the United States in Latin America, focusing specifically on the School of the Americas (SOA) as a way in which the U.S. has institutionalized methodical violence to support its hemispheric hegemony. We will also address the resistance strategies and actions of civil players in Latin America and allies in the United States. In order to do so, we will utilize frameworks within the disciplines of Latin American Studies, Politics, and Sociology, with an emphasis on Social Justice. A candlelight vigil in solidarity with SOA watch was the result of methods including academic research, educational SOA film screenings, planning meetings, and community organizing. Abstract:

Tutors for a Cause is a Pitzer Student run program whose main goal is to build and reenforce bridges between college students and the under served local community. Title: BikeShare: Movement or Mainstream

Abstract:

SmartBikes, the world's first computerized networks that integrate bicycles into public transportation systems, have swept across Europe. Based primarily on the success of the enormous Velib program in Paris, France, the phenomenon has crossed the Atlantic, landing pilot programs in Washington DC and Montreal, Canada, with several other major cities looking into the possibilities. While the SmartBike development arguably represents the largest spread of bicycling in modern history, it is in stark contrast to the more activist-oriented bike movement that has precluded it. By omitting the radical ideas that have previously defined the bike movement, a tension seems to be developing reminiscent of the "green-washing" fears in the larger activist community. But in an interesting twist, initial findings from research done in Seville, Spain in the spring of 2008 prove otherwise—a grassroots activist group by the name of Acontramano (roughly translated as "against the traffic") has in fact appropriated the Sevillano SmartBike system, Sevici, using it to further their own goals. Nonetheless, the field is ripe for further investigation into one of the most important developments in contemporary urban issues. In a paper by Ramon Martinez, senior at Pitzer College and long time member of the Pitzer College Green Bike Program, a student run bicycle co-operative, the above story is recounted to ask the questions that no one is asking, and to propose an alternative vision for implementing large scale bicycle sharing while maintaining grassroots values.
